In 1948 the United Nations recognized the right of the Jews, an ancient people, to a country of their own in their promised homeland. I, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Natanyahu, speak to you on behalf of my country and my people. Israel is a tiny nation, surrounded by enemies that want to wipe it from the map. Palestinian terrorists lie in wait to attack us. This we know. Arab nations aim their weapons at us, ready to use them at any moment. We have been attacked many times, even on our highest religious holiday of Yom Kippur. We know an attack can come today and must be ready. We must be stronger, have better armies and weapons, and we must never give too much or we become weaker. Our land is our strength, and I will do everything within my power to keep it as safe as possible in the midst of extreme danger.

# Wil From My Perspective

My name is Ismail Haniyeh, and I am a leader of Hamas, a major force in governing Palestine. Hamas was founded in 1987 during the first intifada, the uprising against Jewish control of our land. Our numbers are small, compared to the Israeli army. Our weapons are weak compared to their stockpiles and those of the Americans who support them. Therefore, we will do anything to remain alive and to be heard. If we die for our cause, it is with great honor. There are



many among my people willing to give their lives as martyrs for Palestinian freedom.

Palestine was once a homeland to my people, but it was taken from us. Then in the late 1940's we were given small scraps: the West Bank of the Jordan River; the Gaza Strip; and Golan Heights. But even then, Israel again takes our lands. Settlers come, they plow down villages of poor Palestinian people, and they build homes. The government of Israel does not stop them. The government of the United States does not stop them. The United Nations only mumbles protests, but it does not stop them.

There are some, even among my own people, who would also turn away from the settlements and the mistreatment in the name of peace. But Hamas does not believe peace is worth much if not a just peace. We will continue to fight using all methods at hand until the people of Palestine can live in freedom in our own land.

## FROM MY PERSPECTIVE JUI



I am Mahmoud Abbas, leader of the Fatah Party in the Palestinian government. While Fatah shares the religion of Islam and many of the same values as Hamas, we do not accept their fundamentalist views. Fatah does not link religion to government as Hamas and other fundamentalists do. We clearly separate our religious views from what is best for the Palestinian people. At this point we believe the best course is to compromise and make peace.

Of course Fatah has been willing to use violence when needed to achieve our goals in the past. When we were called the Palestinian Liberation Organization, the PLO, we believed violent methods were called for and used them. Now though, we are trying to take a more moderate course. We seek to work with Israel, rather than continue a war that has gone on so long without winning a real, independent Palestinian state. We now want to work with other nations to bring about a lasting agreement that will allow the Palestinian people to live in peace and thrive.

While I must admit that neither approach has yet worked out a lasting settlement, I have hope that with patience we will. All I know is that the people of Palestine are tired of war. They are tired of living in poverty, always in fear, and they want a land of their own. If we can achieve that goal through cooperation and compromise, I am willing to do my part, even if others are too anxious to wait. Enough bloodshed!

### XX FROM MY PERSPECTIVE

My name is Lee Rosenberg, and I'm the president of AIPAC, the American Israel Public Affairs Committee. We work to strengthen the U.S.-Israel relationship and have been called, "the most important organization affecting America's relationship with Israel."

My colleagues and I work to influence U.S. foreign policy to help Israel remain strong and secure. U.S. policy is in fact, very friendly to Israel, as well it should be. It is in America's interest to work with

I, Mike Huckabee, am an American minister and politician and am not afraid to say that my religion does indeed dictate my politics. Take the land of Israel. Christians believe that God formed a covenant, an agreement, with the Jewish people. Throughout the Bible, Christians are called upon to honor and cherish the Jewish people. In Genesis 12:3, for example, God says to Abraham, the Father of the Jewish people, "I will bless those who bless you,

and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you." The Bible also commands us to pray for the peace of Jerusalem, speak out for Zion's (Israel's) sake, and to watch over Jerusalem. I therefore believe the Jews have a Godgiven right to reclaim land given to their ancestors and later taken away from them.

I am not alone in my beliefs either. 75% of conservatives strongly support Israel as an ally and "America's greatest friend in the region." Part of that support means ensuring the Jewish state has access to advanced weapons and technologies to defend itself. We also must support the Israelis to live wherever they want on their land. It concerns me when people in the United States want to tell the people of Israel that they cannot move onto "Palestinian" lands.

Now, please do not misunderstand me. I am not saying that the Palestinians do not also deserve land. As Christians we believe in the right of Palestinians, as all peoples, to a homeland. However, a Palestinian state should be outside of Israel, perhaps in Egypt or Saudi Arabia. There is plenty of Arab land outside of Israel.

As an Arab-American by birth, I Queen Noor of Jordan, widow of the late King Hussein, have a somewhat different view of the Middle East. As a moderate, I believe we must focus on education, careful use of our resources, development, human rights, and cross-cultural understanding. I also believe women should play a key role in development.

Today across the Middle East, women are raising their voices, fighting for their families and for freedom. In Egypt, Tunisia, Libya, Bahrain, Yemen, Palestine, and elsewhere, mothers, daughters, wives, and sisters are joining the struggle for freedom and the right to live in peace. Even as a member of a royal family, I know that both men and women in the region yearn for greater say in their governments.

Women, in particular, view the fight for democracy as a fight for their own freedom. Governments like those of the Taliban in Afghanistan and the king in Saudi Arabia strictly limit women's rights, dictating what they wear, where they go, and how they must act. In many places girls as young as fourteen are married and forced to live according to rules laid down by their husbands, supported by a religion that some view as very pro-male.

This, I believe, must change and may be changing now. I am proud of the people who fight for democracy, yet I fear rapid change could usher in greater fundamentalism. I pray that women are not shoved back from the threshold of freedom.

I am Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, elected president of Iran in 2005. The West always tries to paint me as a terrorist or at least insane, but I am neither. I am a man of the people, and I speak for all Iranians.
